Wadwani is a village having population approximately 20000 and famous for **Wadwani cotton** and known for weaver community. At present more than hundred handloom units are in village.

The **Human Development Index (HDI)** of Beed district and especially Wadwani taluka is very low. The region has diversity in population in Wadwani taluka. Majority of the people belong to Nomedic Tribes, Scheduled Castes, and Other Backward Class.

Executive Summary

Lokmanya Tilak Mahavidyalaya, Wadwani, Dist.Beed is established in 1997. The college works under the aegis of 'Rashtriya Shikshan Prasarak Mandal. Beed (M.S.) and is affiliated to Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad. At the inception the college was mono-faculty i.e. Arts. The college has introduced Science faculty in 2009 and Commerce faculty in 2013. At present the college offers the undergraduate level courses in Bachelor of Arts, Science and Commerce. However, only the Arts faculty is grant- in-aid basis and B.Sc. and B.Com. are on Nongrant basis. The college has the distinction of being the first higher education institute established at taluka level.

The mission statement of the institution is **Dnyanam Param Dhyeyam**, it means 'knowledge is the ultimate aim.' The college is committed to provide quality higher education to the socially and economically backward community in the rural, hilly and drought prone area and strives to bring them into the main stream of higher education.

The vision of the institution is to eliminate the darkness of ignorance by lighting the lamps of knowledge. The mission of the institution is to understand the plurality and diversity of the nation and make them responsible citizens to face the global challenges. The college makes efforts to cater the educational, social, cultural and intellectual needs of the rural students. The college works to develop, employability, leadership and enterprenural skills and provide knowledgable human resource for nation building. The college utilizes the modern technology for educational delivery and adopts the changes to enrich the learning experiences of the students. The college strives to pursue the goals and objectives that have been set forth and plans to develop it into the center of excellence. The college encourages and ensures the holistic development of the students and works with intention to provide human resource of high caliber for national development.

Criterion I: Curricular Aspects

The college is affiliated to Dr. Babasaheb Ambedkar Marathwada University, Aurangabad (M.S). The college offers undergraduate level courses in Arts, Commerce and Science. The affiliating university designs and develops curriculum. The college plays an important role in the development and deployment of action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum designed by the parent university. The college aligns the curriculum with the institutional vision, mission, and objectives. The college has initiated a wide range of curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities to ensure effective curriculum delivery and transaction. The college provides facilities for improving teaching practices and motivates the faculty members to attend various faculty orientation programmes organized by the parent university, the academic staff colleges and other organizations. The college organizes the guest lectures and arranges educational tours and field work activities. The college conducts various programmes to integrate cross-cutting issues likegender equity, climate change, national integrity and environmental awareness etc.

The college has introduced, specially designed four certificate courses. The certificate courses are aimed at acquiring additional skills and the enrichment of regular curricula, in tune with emerging national and global trends and relevant to the local needs and to cope with the needs of the employment market. The faculty members identify the slow learners and advanced learners in the classroom interaction and conduct remedial coaching for slow learners and provide special guidance to advanced learners. The faculty members encourage the students to participate in various curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities.

The faculty members focus on providing learner centered education and consider the diversity of learners while planning and implementing the teaching learning activities and meticulously plan and organize its schedule. The teachers employ interactive and participatory approach in teaching. The faculty members use e-learning resources and ICT based teaching methodologies for effective teaching. The learning environment of the college is conducive for the critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper. The college prepares the special issues of the wall magazines and displays it on the occasions of special days. The college publishes the College Magazine **Sahitya Sanwad** annually to develop the creativity of the students. The students actively represent on the editorial boards of the wall magazines and the college magazine.

The college has appointed meritorious, well qualified, and devoted faculty members and maintained diversity in recruitment. The faculty members are encouraged to attend various seminars, conferences and workshops and to present research papers. The college has formed Women Grievance Redressal Cell for the safety and security of girl students and follows the guidelines of Vishakha Samittee for prevention of sexual harassment of women employees. The suggestion box is mounted in the ladies common room for inserting suggestions and complaints. The local police station has formed Anti-Eve Teasing Squad and it visits the college time to time.

The college takes special efforts to increase pass percentage and to reduce dropout rate. - 5) Teachers and Alumni: The college forms teacher's groups to visit the nearby villages and the group visits the junior colleges. The alumni cooperate the college for enrollment of new students.

College ensures transparency through following policy.

2.1 Catering to Student Diversity

The College sensitizes the students and the staff about environmental issues by organizing activities like tree plantation, cleanliness drive, celebration of the World Environment Day, the World Earth Day. etc. The affiliating university has also introduced a compulsory paper of Environmental Studies to the second year students of B.A., B.Com, and B.Sc. The college organizes various co-curricular activities to sensitize the issues like Gender, Inclusion and Environment.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

2.3 Teaching Learning Process.

a. Academic Calendar

- The teacher's teaching plans are verified by the Head of the Departments and approved by the Principal with necessary recommendations.
- The college has formed IQAC for the effective implementation of teaching-learning and evaluation process.\

c. Evaluation

- The evaluation scheme of students' academic performance is supplied by the affiliating university and the evaluation of the students is done according to the schedule of the university and the college.
- The evaluation of the students is done through class tests, unit tests, home assignments, semester exams, oral tests, seminars, presentations, project work and practical etc.
- The internal and external examiners assess the students' performance in oral, written and practical examinations.
- The college teachers are appointed as examiner, paper setters, invigilators, Joint Chief Superintendants and members of flying squads for the university examination.

The summative assessment is done at the end of the semester on the basis of academic performance such as test, tutorials, assignments, project works etc.

- The leadership provides proper support for policy and planning through the need analysis, research inputs and consultation with the stakeholders. The leadership has developed a mechanism of feedback from the stakeholders, findings of the feedback are considered while framing the policy
- The College has Students Council and the principal is the ex- officio president of the council. The principal and the student representatives take decisions with mutual consultation for reinforcing the culture of excellence.
- The college leadership utilizes the strategic tool of SWOC analysis to find out the position of the institute in the competitive environment and identifies probable difficulties and bring organizational changes to improve the organizational performance for the larger interest of the institutions.

- The college conducts monthly staff meetings to take a review of implementation plan and evaluate operationalization of previously taken decisions.
- The Principal calls departmental meeting for micro- planning of activities for effective implementation of the institutional plans of improvement.
- The institution has started feedback system from various stakeholders for the monitoring and evaluating policies.
- The suggestions received through suggestion box, help to plan the policy.
- The institution encourages participative management system for mutual benefit. The student representatives are appointed on various committees to monitor and evaluate the institutional activities

• The student delegates are sent to attend leadership camps organized by the university.

6.2.3 Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making Processes.

- The Principal is the administrative head of the institution. The principal forms various committees for the smooth functioning of academic and extra-curricular activities in the college. There are committees for specific purpose like Committee Against Sexual Harassment, Anti-Ragging Committee etc.
- The heads of the various departments are responsible for the day to day administration of the department and they report to the principal.
- The college has student council which plays an important role in the implementation various institutional activities.
- The administrative office works for the day to day college administration under the guidance of the principal

Decision-making

- The LMC is formed as per the Maharashtra University Act -1994 under section 85. LMC is the policy making body which monitors the entire academic and administrative functioning on behalf of the Governing executive body.
- The management and the Local Management Committee take all major decisions regarding annual budget allocation, recruitment of teaching and non-teaching staff, development of infrastructure facilities, student support and welfare schemes.
- The decisions of the LMC are communicated and implemented through the Principal.
- The Principal forms various committees for the effective implementation of the academic and other activities.
- The views of faculty members, students and other stakeholders are taken into consideration in the decision making process.

Teaching and Learning

• The staff members are recruited on merit basis. The college has adopted a feedback method for monitoring, evaluating and improving teaching learning process. For effective teaching and learning process, the institute provides infrastructure. The faculty members are given support and motivated to use teaching aids and adopt participatory teaching methods. Daily Teaching Report (DTR) is compulsory for all teachers. Annual planning of the syllabus is also compulsory for all teachers. At the end of the academic year, the teachers submit their self-appraisals. The principal observes teaching-learning process and motivates teaches to apply innovative and interactive teaching methods for the effective teaching-learning process. The outstanding students are encouraged to participate in curricular and Co-curricular activities and suitably awarded.

Research and development

 The college supports the faculty members to undertake research and development activities. The library resources are provided to the researchers. Duty leaves are granted to faculty members and they are inspired to participate in seminars, conferences, workshops and short term courses. They are motivated to publish research papers in reputed journals.

. Community engagement

The institution offers a wide range of programmes for community engagement and development through National Service Scheme. The volunteers of N.S.S. organize rallies, lectures and cultural programmes for community development such as-blood donation, tree plantation, raising relief funds for victims of natural calamity, cleanliness drive, superstition eradication , water conservation etc.

Yes, There had been instances of court cases filed by and against the institute due to misunderstanding, the cases have been settled and solved.

- The college has filed a case in high-court for the 100% grants for the first college at taluka level to the commerce and science faculty against the Government of Maharashtra.
- The Non-Teaching staff had filed a case against the principal, secretary

of the institution and the joint director of higher education the court has given an order to reinstate them with back wages.

• Yes, the college receives feedback from students regarding institutional performance. The feedback is collected from the meeting of student council and interface of the principal with students. - The N.S.S unit of the college organizes the relief fund rallies to raise funds to help the victims of natural calamity such as-flood earthquake, landslide, Tsunami and drought. The college has helped the families of farmers who have committed suicides due to continuous drought in Beed district.
- The college staff and alumni members jointly contribute and deposit money to give financial assistance to the students who hails from socially and economically weak strata of the society.

Title of the Practice: Reach to Unreached

1. Goals

- To attract and retain the rural talent in higher education
- To empower and shape the rural and backward masses by providing higher education.
- To investigate the condition of socially and educationally backward classes.
- To acquaint with difficulties and barriers of rural and backward communities regarding higher education.
- To increase the enrollment to higher education and find out the possible remedies.

The Context

The college is located in rural, hilly and drought prone area. The most of the people are engaged in farming and sugar factory labourers. The real India lives in village as more than half of the population of the country lives in villages, rural development is prominent factor for the development of nation. The higher education is the backbone of modern society It has the power to transform human beings into human resources. The higher education is an instrument to build future generation. In India majority of the higher educational institution are urban-centric. The rural population is deprived of quality higher education. The gross enrollment ratio of the rural students is very poor in the rural area, the situation is very worse for female population. The practice is in relevance to the mission statement of the college. **Dnyanam** Param Dheyam knowledge is the ultimate aim. The practice focuses on developing India as knowledge society. The college knows the vital importance of higher education for the national development as it is powerful tool to build knowledge based society. Most of the students are the first generation learners so they must be attracted and retained in higher education and this practice is useful for this reason

The Practice

The college has started the practice form the inception of the college in 1997. The practice is aimed at to provide access to rural students in higher

education and to increase the enrollment of economically weak and backward communities in the college. The college has formed groups of teachers and allotted 2 villages for a group of two teachers for the propagation and extension of higher education in rural area in college periphery. The team of teachers visits the allotted village and conducts corner meetings with parents, students and the villagers. The teachers have prepared the lists of alumni of the college, who resides in the village and take their help in the implementation of the practice. The team submits the detailed report of the visits to the principal. The database in prepared on the basis of reports received from the teachers and used for further contact and admission. The team of teachers visits the feeding junior colleges where the prospective students are available and arrange a guidance lecture for students highlighting importance of higher education. The team prepares the lists of 12th passed students in various streams like Arts, Commerce, Science etc. and visit door to door to contact with the students and parents.

The team of teachers gives information to the students about importance of higher education, the courses available in the college, the information about various government schemes and scholarships and concessions available to the students belonging to SC, ST, OBC, NT. SBC and economically weaker section of the society and differently- abled persons. The faculty members guide students to choose the stream and subject combination as per the student's interest. The faculty members give special attention to the academic needs of the students and provide guidance for higher educational opportunities and job opportunities. The faculty members motivate the students to participate in curricular and extracurricular activities of the college.

Evidence of success

The practice has proved useful to improve the educational status of the people who live in the college periphery. The enrollment of students form SC, ST, OBC, NT, SBC and specially women have increased notably in last five years .The awareness about higher education has increased in the parent and the parent personally taking lead in the education of girls. The practice is useful to college as it helps to acquaint with difficulties and barriers of backward communities regarding higher education. The practice helped to establish the good community contact with stakeholders.

Problems encountered and resources required:

The college has encountered the following problems while implementing the practice.

- The mindset of the villagers about women education is negative.
- The most of the students can't afford higher education so they prefer work for wages to education.
- The means of transportation from village to college are limited.
- The early marriages of girls stop their higher education

Best Practice – 2

Title of the Practice:

Financial Assistance to Economically Weak Students.

Goal:

- To help the economically weak students.
- To reduce the dropout rate of the students.
- To bring the low-income group student in main stream of education.
- To provide opportunity of higher education to rural students.
- To provide financial assistance to students coming from rural areas.
- To make education available to all irrespective of their social and economic status.

The context:

The college is situated in rural area most of the students are from low income group so rural youth have generally been left behind the mainstream of higher education. A large number of students form marginalized sections are studying in the college. The college faculty members have noticed that lack of money is the main reason of high dropout rate. Before receiving degree most of the students leave college. As they decide to earn money by working full time than pursuing unaffordable degree. It is found that half of the student, who left college have annual income under Rs.1 lakh. The lack of parent support and financial support result in dropouts.

The college is located in drought prone zone. The people from this region are always in search of work and wages. The parents are either farmers or sugar factory laborers. The students have to work in their farm. The people give importance to wages than education .This practice is initiated to bring economically weak students in the main stream of education. The college provides financial assistance to poor and deserving student's through contribution from faculty and alumni.

The Practice:

The practice was proposed by the Principal and considered in the meeting of the alumni and the decision was taken to raise funds and help the economically weak students by the joint venture of the college staff members and the Alumni Association. The purpose of the scheme is to enhance the accessibility and retain talent of students belonging to economically weaker section of the society in higher education. The college has started the scheme of financial assistance to the students of the college belonging to the economically weaker sections of the society. The college has evolved an objective and transparent mechanism for the disbursement of financial assistance. The Principal has formed a joint committee of the faculty members and the alumni members. The fund is raised through the monthly pigmy contribution of faculty members and the alumni. The collected amount is deposited in the joint account of the principal and the alumni association.

The scheme is open to all the students of the college .However, the faculty members assess the economic condition/financial requirement of the students, taking into account factors like the livelihood pattern of the family, the locality of habitation of the family, the nature and number of dependents, the socio economic status of the family, the financial needs of the students and

academic performance in previous examination and other relevant parameters. The faculty members interact with the parents and relatives of the students. In certain cases, the committee may recommend physical inspection of the home and living standard of the family to assess the economic condition. The faculty members recommend the names of needy students to the principal.

The decision of the principal is final in the grant of financial assistance. The applicants and their parents are expected to appear before the approval committee. The copy of family annual income certificate issued by the Tahshildar or the Area SDM or the officer authorized and an affidavit is taken form students. The previous academic performance—is taken into account to grant the financial assistance. The recommendation letter of the counseling committee is attached along with application from .The list of applicants who are approved financial assistance is displayed on the notice board of the college. The Differently abled students are given preference in financial assistance In case of "Single girl child, applicants the committee considers it kindly and appropriately for financial assistance to promote the overall gender justice and women empowerment in the society.

Evidence of success:

The practice is in relevance with the institutional goal **Dnyanam Param Dhayam.** The ultimate aim is to spread knowledge in the society. The practice helps the college to strengthen the social relationship and ensures the social commitment of the college towards the student. The college has taken this initiative from last two years 2014-15, 2015-16.

The maximum students in our college are form economically weak section of the society only few are benefited. The counseling of the parents of the girl students was challenging and difficult. The same students are applying for the next academic year. It is difficult to select the needy students because the demand is greater and the fund isn't sufficient as compared to the strength of the economically weak and needy students






